<p>1. Sea Life Fact file: Research information about an animal or plant which lives in the sea. Include information about where it is found, what it looks like and what it needs to survive. You could present your findings in the style of a poster or leaflet.</p>	<p>2. Float or Sink? Complete a float or sink experiment in your bath or sink. Collect together 8 to 10 household items made from different materials. Make a prediction first about whether you think each item will float or sink before testing it out. Record the outcomes in a table of results in your book.</p>	<p>3. Water Safety poster: Create an informative poster for children about staying safe near water or at the seaside. Include a key to explain the different flags used on UK beaches to help keep people safe as well as other top tips. The Cbeebies and RNLI websites have child friendly information and a short video explanation.</p>

<p>4. Be a food critic: Help to prepare and then try a new fish or seafood dish at home. Make a list of ingredients you used and write a sentence to explain if you enjoyed it.</p>	<p>5. Movie Time: Watch a family friendly film based on sea creatures or set under the sea such as, Finding Nemo or The Little Mermaid. Write a short review in your book after you have watched the film and tell us why you enjoyed it. You could give the film a star rating out of 5 too!</p>	<p>6. An Ocean Diorama: Using a small box or shoebox, make a 3D ocean diorama. Paint the box a shade of blue before adding sea animals and plants. Use your safe internet skills to look at range of examples online before making your own.</p>

<p>7. Sing a sea song: Learn and perform a sea themed song and dance. Ask your adult at home to record a short video and upload it to your Dojo portfolio so we can watch it at school. Feel free to dress up or put on a sea themed mask!</p>	<p>8. A 2D Fish: Can you design and draw your own fish using only 2D shapes. Try to use a ruler to help you draw some straight lines or create a collage using shapes that you have cut out. Colour your fish in and give it a background if you like!</p>	<p>9. Letter in a bottle: Pretend you have been stranded on a desert island! Write a letter to someone at home explaining what has happened and where you are. Then, roll it up and pop it in a bottle and pretend you are going to send it home across the oceans! Maybe you could tea stain it too so it looks like it has travelled really far.</p>

<p>10. Plastic Pollution: Using your safe internet skills, find out about plastic pollution in our oceans and how it is affecting the animals that live in the sea. What can we do to try and reduce plastic waste? Record your top tips in your book.</p>	<p>11. Build a boat: Use recycled items or Lego / Duplo pieces to build a boat. Does your boat float or capsize if you test it out in the sink or in the bath? How sturdy is your boat? Will it carry any passengers - you could use Lego characters or small animals. Take a picture of your model boat and ask your adult to upload any photos to your Dojo portfolio. Or bring your model into school to show us.</p>	<p>12. Paper plate fish: Can you make a tropical fish using a paper plate? Decorate your fish with bright, bold colours. You could use paints, crayons or colouring pens. Feel free to add any decoration such as wiggly eyes or pom poms. Bring in your fish to show us in class or upload a photo to your dojo portfolio.</p>
